<u>Description</u>: "The Martian, SpaceX, Mars One. The idea of colonising Mars has captured the imagination of the world recently, turning from 'if' to 'when', from science fiction to real missions. In this talk we tackle one of the big problems - could you really survive on Mars once you run out of the Earth food supplies? Could you actually grow crops and plants on Mars? Kyle Grant will explain the science and feasibility of the idea behind The Martian. Lord Hennessy of Nympsfield, 'Brexit: Where are we now?' 3pm-4.30pm, Sunday 19th February T.S. Eliot Theatre, Merton College

The Bodley Club and Oxford Bar Society are delighted to announce that Lord Hennessy of Nympsfield will be giving a lecture entitled 'Brexit: Where are we now?'. This is a fantastic chance to hear the foremost British constitutional historian discuss the defining moment in contemporary politics.

Lord Hennessy is renowned for his work as an historian, academic writer and journalist (in print and on radio), specialising in British government and political theory. He co-founded the Institute of Contemporary British History in 1986 and since 2001 has been Atlee Professor of contemporary British History at Queen Mary's, London. He won the Duff Cooper Prize for 'Never Again: Britain 1945-51' and the Orwell Prize in 2007 for 'Having it so Good: Britain in the 1950s'.

All you need to have is minimum B1 level in the language of your host country (so, roughly AS equivalent) and to be an English native speaker - further eligibility details can be found on the website.

2. Research study – participants needed

Interested in taking part in a research study?

We are looking for healthy volunteers aged 18-40 years and fluent in English to take part in a study investigating how a single dose of the medication losartan affects learning and information processing, using a simple computer task. Losartan is currently used to treat high blood pressure. However, we think that it may also enhance the effectiveness of psychological therapies such as Cognitive-Behaviour Therapy. The study involves three appointments of about 5 hours in total.

3. Dealer App

The Dealer is on a mission to save everyone money on their food and drink and revolutionize the way people give back. The Dealer App has launched its beta version in Oxford and it needs test users to enjoy money off food and drink. Yes that is actually what they are offering! The deal is simple: they have got 100 venues in Oxford who have agreed to give everyone on The Dealer App discounts at certain times of the day.

All they ask in exchange is that you consider giving a tiny amount (\pounds 0.30) of the money The Dealer saves you back to the local community in support of the fight against homelessness. You can also give back in the form of time, 10 minutes (which you can exchange for a volunteer shift when you hit two hours) or you can just pass on a good deed. The app is free, gets you a discount at your favorite venues and helps everyone give back. We are looking for people to trial this version of the product and give any feedback they have on design, layout and any requests for deals that you want to see that are not currently on there. To download it type 'the dealer app' into the App Store and start saving and giving!

"Since Prevent became a mandatory duty in 2015, requiring institutions to have "due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism", there has been a fundamental shift in the student-institutional relationship. We want to explore the nature of that change, and whether this has led to any change in campus freedoms. Where there have been reports that the Prevent duty is infringing upon the rights of students, they must be seriously investigated."
